




Will Keeps & Chief Wingert...

A Dynamic Duo

An unlikely duo at first glance... even Chief Wingert said, "Look, we are polar opposite." Although that may appear to be the case on the outside, Will Keeps and Des Moines Police Chief Dana Wingert are more like brothers and have much in common on the inside... love for kids and families, the city of Des Moines and each other.

Their friendship started when their daughters played on the same AAU basketball team. Whether games were in Des Moines or on the road, one thing each noticed... as parents, they were always there.

Now this unlikely duo is working together to bring a message of hope to youth city-wide. Will, a hip-hop artist originally from the southside of Chicago, is going into the schools and the streets to end violence and encourage education to change the direction of kids' lives.

It was after the death of a 16-year-old athlete in June of 2015, Will produced "Wake-up Iowa," a hip-hop video that pleads with Des Moines families to not be like bigger cities and allow their children to fall into the traps of drug users and street gangs. His inspiring video led to a second, "We Fight," that with the help of Chief Wingert tells the story of a police officer shooting a young black man during a convenience store robbery, only to twist



the ending and portray Chief Wingert as the one being shot. The message was simple and powerful, to stop the violence and become united.

Youth looking for role models, today's superheroes, don't have to look any further than Will Keeps and Chief Wingert--two people working together finding ways to bring positive change.

And although they may appear to be indestructible, as Chief Wingert reminds us, "The heart and mind that are so fragile also is what makes us as humans good."




A Doer Making a Difference...

Will Keeps

Will Keeps is a rapper and R&B artist out of Des Moines. Raised on Chicago's southside, he uses his heart and talent to reach and empower youth, and promote anti-violence. From personal experiences, Will knows why he does it. He was molested at seven; he was beat and stabbed at 15, and the offenders tried to shoot him, but the gun jammed; and he saw his friend killed in front of him. Will has had eight surgeries on his face and head, with scars that he keeps covered requiring shots every three months. Will loves God, his family and kids...

Kids are into hip-hop, so Will is working to reach them through music videos. With his original rap and inspiring messages, he has the streets, schools and community behind him.

Will also has a commitment to the students at Harding Middle School, whom he asked to help him make his recent video, "Greatness." Located on Des Moines' northside, staff at Harding love and care for all kids and teach being collaborative, professional and respectful. With 800 students who come from dozens of countries and languages, theirs is a challenge and help is appreciated. Will works to reach kids this age before it's too late and teach them to make good choices.

the "I Have a Dream Foundation" to benefit six students from Harding who played a big part in the video.

He has written a new song "Droppin" about the community working as one unit to understand the death of young black men and innocent bystanders. Chief Wingert and other community leaders have already signed-up to be a part of this music video and its goal to stop violence and come together as a community.

The Des Moines Police Department (DMPD) is the largest law enforcement agency in Iowa. With nearly 500 officers and civilian staff members, they protect and serve our capitol city 24 hours a day.

The 74th DMPD recruit class started January 3 with sixteen members who took the first step in a long and challenging journey to become DMPD officers.

Police Chief Dana Wingert says times have changed, "Thirty years ago, a police department was judged by response time and solving crime. Although still important, today equally it is, 'What does the community think of you?'"

Now in his third year many highly regard Chief Wingert and his officers and staff. Over the past year, hearts were broken at the DMPD and across the community over the tragic loss of officers' lives in separate events. During those times that would rock anyone's world, many looked to Chief Wingert for leadership and comfort.

Chief Wingert believes "in controlling the things you can, and faith will take care of the rest." But then asks, "What are you thankful for? Do we thank God for our blessings?"

Paul Harvey...

The Rest of the Story

I listened to Paul Harvey for years... first in eastern Iowa where I grew up; and as an adult on Newsradio 1040 WHO. From the 1950s through the 1990s, Harvey's programs reached as many as 24 million people every week.

Born in Tulsa, Oklahoma, in 1918 as Paul Harvey Aurandt, he became known to all as Paul Harvey for his unmistakable voice that, no matter what the topic, was calming every day to millions of Americans. His "Paul Harvey News and Comment" was broadcast weekday mornings and mid-days on more than 1,200 radio stations, 400 Armed Forces Network stations and published in 300 newspapers... and I can still hear the start of his broadcast of "'Hello, Americans, this is Paul Harvey! Stand by for news!'"



Harvey was a close friend of Billy Graham, and he championed love of God and country. His nononsense common sense resonated with listeners. In 2005 he was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the United States' most prestigious civilian award, by President George W. Bush.



He passed away in 2009 at the age of 90.

BUT HERE IS THE "REST OF HIS STORY"...

Harvey was the son of a policeman who was killed by robbers in 1921 when he was just three years old. His father and a friend (a Tulsa police detective) were hunting while off-duty when approached by four armed men who attempted to rob them. His father was shot and died two days later. The four robbers were identified by the surviving detective and arrested the day after. All four were tried, convicted, and received life terms.

In a style similar to his famous "So God Made a Farmer," he wrote and read "Policeman" in 1970 as a tribute to his father and the many police officers who risk their lives daily. And it is as relevant today as ever...

"Policeman..."

A policeman is a composite of what all men are, I guess, a mingling saint and sinner, dust and deity. What that really means is that they are exceptional, they are unusual, they are not commonplace. Buried under the froth is the fact: and the fact is, less than one-half of one percent of policemen misfit that uniform. And that is a better average than you would find among clergymen!

What is a policeman? He, of all men, is at once the most needed and the most wanted. A strangely nameless creature who is "sir" to his face and "pig" or worse behind his back.

He must be such a diplomat that he can settle differences between individuals so that each will think he won.

But...if the policeman is neat, he is conceited; If he's careless, he's a bum. If he's pleasant, he's a flirt; If he's not, he's a grouch.

He must make instant decisions which would require months for a lawyer.

But...if he hurries, he's careless; if he's deliberate, he's lazy. He must be first to an accident, infallible with a diagnosis. He must be able to start

breathing, stop bleeding, tie splints and above all, be sure the victim goes home without a limp.

The police officer must know every gun, draw on the run, and hit where it doesn't hurt. He must be able to whip two men twice his size and half his age without damaging his uniform and without being "brutal." If you hit him...he's a coward. If he hits you...he's a bully.

The policeman, from a single human hair, must be able to describe the crime, the weapon, the criminal and tell you where the criminal is hiding. But...if he catches the criminal, he's lucky; if he doesn't, he is a dunce.

He runs files and writes reports until his eyes ache, to build a case against some felon who will get "dealed out" by a shameless shamus.

The policeman must be a minister, a social worker, a diplomat, a tough guy and a gentleman.

And of course, he'll have to be a genius...because he will have to feed a family on a policeman's salary.

She was assigned a project for school where students were asked to think of a world problem and an idea to solve it. Grace thought about it for about a week until one day it clicked. She could put her passion and talent to use in creating jewelry and crafts to sell, while donating profits toward buying Bibles!

"Design with God in Mind" is both the purpose and the name of her shop on Etsy. Grace works to raise money to honor God by providing Bibles to needy people at home and abroad. Telugu is a language native to India, so money was sent to Hope and Helps Ministry where a local evangelist was able to purchase 30 Telugu Bibles and distribute to the poor in Rajahmundry, a city in eastern India.

Joshua Christian Academy...

Changing a Child's Future

Situations in life are often outside our control, which is especially true for children. And sometimes they and their families need a little help...

"It is a privilege to help people who truly are doing the best they can," says Chris Hurley, president of Joshua Christian Academy's Board.

Imagine some kids whose fathers have been murdered or are in prison, others are living in a shelter or are being raised by grandparents - or great-grandparents. 50% of the kids being raised in single parent homes... and other children whose parents just want to raise their children in a Christian school. There are no issues; they just love Christian education.

JCA started in 2009 with just nine students in a one-room classroom. Since that modest beginning, they have grown

These and many more situations describe the lives of students who attend Joshua Christian Academy (JCA) in Des Moines. They are good kids with good families who are making an effort to change their difficult situation and need a little support.

and been able to purchase a former public elementary school and community center, located just 1.5 miles northeast of the Iowa state capitol. JCA has grown each year to now serving 115 economically disadvantaged urban youth in grades K-9.

Christian education students receive is transformational – altering and changing the direction of their lives.



Amazing results in learning, as JCA students are 72% proficient in reading compared to 35% of the national average and also performed well in math, social studies and science.

JCA follows the basic curriculum (language arts, mathematics, science, history and the arts) while focusing on spiritual and social values, including reconciliation, responsibility, respect, character and hard work. Loving teachers with a passion for God and a heart for helping children succeed are carefully chosen. Class sizes are small - averaging 15 students per class-so all students receive the attention needed to succeed.

Every day starts with all students in chapel. New students learn to recite an entire chapter of the Bible and more than 40 responsive verses in just their first year. Older kids are able to recite the Gettysburg address, a fifth of Martin Luther King Jr's "I Have a Dream" speech and more.

Students are expected to demonstrate stellar conduct in the classroom that supports a positive learning atmosphere. They attend JCA because their families want them to receive this high-quality,

well-rounded Christian education, and they make a sacrifice, too.

Families give up public school free breakfast, lunch transportation. and families are required pay some tuition (min. \$50 per month) and provide transportation to JCA. Kids must wear uniforms and all have jobs to help keep the school clean! Recently while at JCA, two nine-year-old students came late in the afternoon to the room I was in to empty the trash, which was their responsibility daily for two weeks before rotating to a different job.

Rev. Keith Ratliff, Sr., JCA's executive director, says, "The mission of Joshua Christian Academy is to build a

Christ-centered academic foundation within the hearts and minds of urban children, equipping them and their families to serve God and others to their fullest potential through an outstanding Christian education."

God continues to bless the students and families at Joshua Christian Academy through its teachers, board and volunteers... and also through the churches, businesses and individuals whose hearts are touched and are helping change a child's future.

JCA has a vision with their "Building Our Future" campaign. They hope to expand to a K-12 grade curriculum over the next three years and serve more students.



Five new classrooms to be built in this large open space.

Within its existing building, JCA needs to build five new classrooms to accommodate the additional tenth, eleventh, and twelfth grades. Extensive



renovations must occur to improve the facilities: remodel bathrooms and replace mechanical systems (old boiler and rusty pipes). To reach their goal, JCA is praying and sharing their story asking for support from partners, volunteers and the community.



Progress shows God working in the lives of everyone attending and volunteering at JCA. Groups donate food for lunches at school; others have come to replace old windows. Some financially support 87% of the school's operating budget that is received from donations (with families paying 13% of tuition costs).

Henry Blackaby, author of Experiencing God, illustrates clearly what is happening at JCA when he said, "Watch to see where God is working, and join Him in His work."

Shine Your Light

You are the **light of the world.**A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it in its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.

- Matthew 5:14-16

I conducted an exercise with support group several years ago. I encouraged participants to turn to one another and take turns asking the question, "Who are you?" One of the ladies graciously agreed to demonstrate the "Who are you?" dialogue with me. She responded immediately with a laugh and the statement, "I am fat!" She then continued a litany of other things about herself that were wrong. I don't remember any of them because I wanted to stop and redirect her ASAP. I

encouraged her to focus on more simple, factual (less negative and judgmental) self-statements.

Is this woman alone in her automatic perceptions of herself? By no means! I frequently have automatic thoughts that are demeaning. ľm pretty sure you have those types of automatic thoughts too. Certainly we all seem to struggle with "I'm not good enough" or "not acceptable" thoughts.

Take note right now, however, that those descriptions are simply not true! They are more likely statements of a negative self-concept or an expression of negative feelings. If I confuse "Who I am" with "How I am feeling," then the "worlds" I create with my words will be very dramatic, unstable and probably dark.

"Who I am" is not a negative perception or judgment. Who I am and who you are is amazing and well designed. We are more unique and capable than anything else in all of God's creation. Your life is special. It carries a reflection of God to the world around you...if you let it. So let your light shine. No doubt, it can be tough. We are bombarded by "not good enough" thinking, toxic comparisons and fears of failure. In fact, it seems as though we are more comfortable talking about what we hate, what we don't like, what we stand against and what we will not do. Letting our lights shine, however, looks like talking about what we love, what we like, what we stand for and what we are doing or excited to do.

What does it look like to let your light shine?

Spend a few minutes, with a pen and paper in hand, and answer the following questions:

What do I love? (Identify people, activities or causes)

What do I like? (Keep it simple or shoot for the stars. For example, do you like lattes or iced tea? What was your childhood dream? Honor your own unique "likes.")

What do I stand for? (What values drive you? For example, "honesty," "love," "commitment," and other

good characteristics that benefit you and the world around you.)

What do I enjoying doing? (Hint: When you do these things you lose track of time because you are having such a great time!)

What am I excited to do? (What are you looking forward to doing tomorrow, next week, next year? Allow yourself to dream.)
